Jessica Andruss is an assistant professor of Religious studies at the University of Virginia. She studies Jewish cultural and intellectual history in the Islamic world. Her book, *Jewish Piety in Islamic Jerusalem*, is forthcoming from Oxford University Press.

Marion Katz, professor of Middle Eastern and Islamic studies at New York University, is a specialist in premodern Islamic law with a focus on themes of gender and ritual. She is the author (among other works) of *Women in the Mosque: A History of Legal Thought and Social Practice* (2014) and of *Wives and Work: Islamic Law and Ethics before Modernity* (forthcoming, 2022).

Felicitas Opwis is an associate professor of Arabic and Islamic studies at Georgetown University. Her main research field focuses on Islamic jurisprudence and the relationship of Islamic legal theory to the intellectual discourse in other fields of Muslim learning as well as the historical context in which Islamic law is articulated.

Zvi Stampfer is a currently the Maurice Amado Foundation Fellow at the Katz Center. His research focuses on comparative study of Jewish (halakhah) and Islamic (shariʻa) religious law, the Judeo-Arabic culture and literature in the medieval Islamic world, as well as Cairo Genizah research.
